Asaph's Story

- Asaph was a musician King David appointed as music minister in Jerusalem.
- Asaph led the Jews in praise and worship when Israel's most sacred object the Art of the Covenant—arrived in Jerusalem.
- Asaph and his family became one of the three Levite clans in charge of music after King Solomon built the temple in Jerusalem.
- A dozen Psalms bear his name. (Psalm 50, 73-83)
- Something happened in Asaph's life, but we don't know what.

Lessons from Asaph's Psalm for those Thinking about Throwing in the Towel

Psalm 73

1. Focusing on _____ will depress you.

Psalm 73:1–12, HCSB - ¹ God is indeed good to Israel, to the pure in heart. ² But as for me, my feet almost slipped; my steps nearly went astray. ³ For I envied the arrogant; I saw the prosperity of the wicked. ⁴ They have an easy time until they die, and their bodies are well fed. ⁵ They are not in trouble like others; they are not afflicted like most people. ⁶ Therefore, pride is their necklace, and violence covers them like a garment. ⁷ Their eyes bulge out from fatness; the imaginations of their hearts run wild. ⁸ They mock, and they speak maliciously; they

arrogantly threaten oppression. ⁹ They set their mouths against heaven, and their tongues strut across the earth. ¹⁰ Therefore His people turn to them and drink in their overflowing words. ¹¹ The wicked say, "How can God know? Does the Most High know everything?" ¹² Look at them—the wicked! They are always at ease, and they increase their wealth.

2. Focusing on _____ will disappoint you.

Psalm 73:13–14, NLT - ¹³ <u>Did I keep my heart pure for nothing?</u> <u>Did I keep myself innocent for no reason?</u> ¹⁴ <u>I get nothing but trouble</u> all day long; every morning brings me pain.

3. Focusing on _____ will deliver you.

A. It gives you an eternal perspective.

Psalm 73:18–20, NLT - ¹⁸ Truly, you put them on a slippery path and send them sliding over the cliff to destruction. ¹⁹ In an instant they are destroyed, completely swept away by terrors. ²⁰ When you arise, O Lord, you will laugh at their <u>silly ideas</u> as a person laughs at dreams in the morning.

B. It shows you who you really are.

Psalm 73:21–22, NLT -²¹ Then I realized that my heart was <u>bitter</u>, and I was all <u>torn up inside</u>. ²² I was so <u>foolish</u> and <u>ignorant</u>— I must have seemed like a senseless animal to you.

C. It shows you who God really is.

Psalm 73:23–24, NLT -²³ Yet I still belong to you; You hold my right hand. ²⁴ You guide me with your counsel, leading me to a glorious destiny.

D. It shows you what you really have.

Psalm 73:25–28, NCV -²⁵ I have no one in heaven but you; I want nothing on earth besides you. ²⁶ My body and my mind may become weak, but <u>God is my strength</u>. He is mine forever. ²⁷ Those who are far from God will die; you destroy those who are unfaithful. ²⁸ But I am close to God, and that is good. The Lord GOD is my protection. I will tell all that you have done.

Two Questions to Ponder this Thanksgiving

- A. Do you measure God's blessings by the <u>prosperity</u> in your life or your <u>closeness</u> to Him? (Is it "what you have from God" or "who you are in God" that moves you?)
- B. Do you focus on <u>circumstances</u> that lead you to want to "throw in the towel" or <u>His Presence in you</u> that leads you to "lift up praises" to God?
